



DODGE CITY INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENT

U.S. 56/U.S. 283/U.S. 400/2ND AVENUE | FORD COUNTY

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Dodge City intersection improvement project would rebuild or reconfigure the U.S. 56/U.S. 283/U.S. 400/2nd Avenue intersection to serve current and future projected traffic demands. Traffic volumes are expected to increase at this location due to new development opportunities, such as the proposed Hilmar Cheese Company facility.

Results from a traffic impact study, commissioned by Ford County and Dodge City, indicated a roundabout as a preferred alternative. Since then, KDOT has hired a consultant company to do additional analysis and it has confirmed a roundabout with two oversized-load bypass legs in the southern two quadrants would provide the best level of service, operations and safety for future traffic projections.

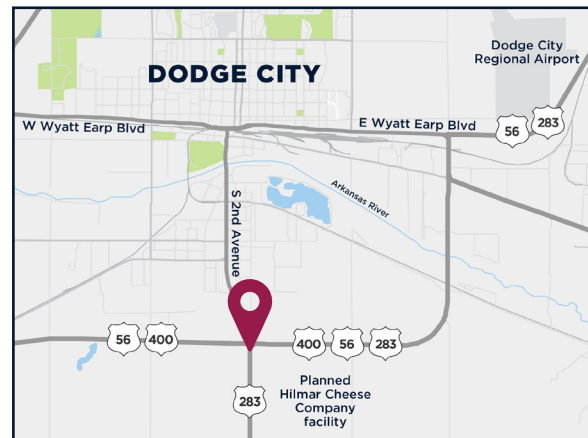
Typical four-way intersections have 32 points of conflict (places where potential crashes can occur). Roundabouts have eight points of conflict, a significant reduction from traditional intersections.

Studies have found roundabouts constructed at intersections along high-speed, two-lane rural highways reduced overall crashes by up to 68% and injury crashes by 88%.

Cost Estimate	\$7.6 million - 100% funded with state dollars through KDOT's Safety/Intersection Improvement Program
Scope	Rebuild or reconfigure the U.S. 56/U.S. 283/U.S. 400/2nd Avenue intersection to serve current and future projected traffic demands
Estimated Construction Schedule	Project is currently in design; pending public input, construction could begin spring 2023
